Subject: Second Consultation on the pilot edition of the 'IOC State of the Ocean Report' (StOR)

The pilot edition of the 'IOC State of the Ocean Report' was presented to the IOC Executive Council at its 55th session in June 2022 as IOC Technical series, <u>173</u>. The pilot edition was drafted after an initial consultation of Member States and experts that started in April 2021 (Ref. IOC Circular Letter, <u>2843</u>) and is structured around the Challenges of the United Nations Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development (2021–2030).

In its decision EC-55/3.3, the Council welcomed the regular publication of the StOR on the model provided by the pilot edition of the Report but requested an opportunity and more time for IOC Member States to provide further comments on the scope, process, frequency and plans going forward for its future editions.

During the Executive Council (EC-55) the following key points were raised and opinions expressed:

- The StOR was referred to as being important for sustainable development and to track changes in the Ocean, as well as progress in addressing the Decade Challenges.
- The role of the StOR to strengthen ocean governance and the science-policy interface, as well as raising awareness, was recognized.
- The StOR was referred to as a potential major contribution to the Ocean Decade, as well as to—and complementary to—the World Ocean Assessment, providing guidance to and serving as a resource for Member States in addressing the different Challenges of the Ocean Decade.
- The StOR concept for future editions was welcomed as a pan-UN publication and an outcome of the Decade.
- The StOR should focus on key indicators for each Ocean Decade Challenge.

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- It was stressed that the StOR has to be based on data wherever these exist and that the identification or reconfirmation of data gaps is equally important.
- The pilot edition StOR structure around the Decade Challenges was commended.
- Several Member States urged that the report ought to be shorter and concise.
- Key high-level messages were recommended to be spelled out stronger, including the expected or documented impact on society.
- Concern was expressed for the capacity of the IOC Secretariat to develop a StOR on an annual basis. A biennial cycle (every second year) was proposed by several Member States.
- The continued development of the StOR was supported and it was recognized that it is essential that human and budgetary resources are secured for its further development and delivery.

Through the present Circular Letter, the IOC Secretariat solicit the views of Member States on the pilot edition of the StOR. The input received, preferably in English, will provide the basis for a revised scope and outline of the StOR to be presented to the Assembly at its 32nd session in June 2023.

In submitting comments and suggestions on the pilot edition of the StOR, Member States are invited to use the template annexed hereafter or to reply via using the <u>online form</u>. This will greatly ease the processing and analysis of your suggestions and proposals.
